

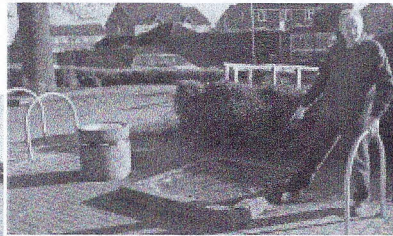
Reasons to vote for Robin Parker

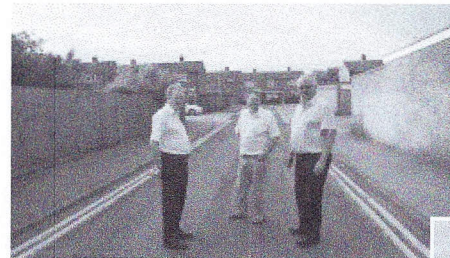

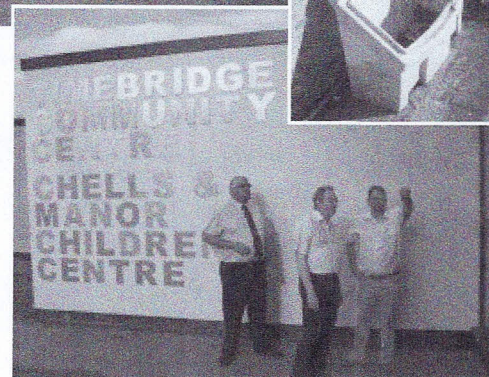

Below: Robin Parker checks the yellow lines on the steps at Mobbsbury shops have been re-done correctly.



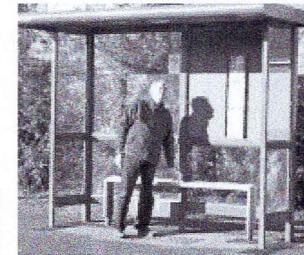

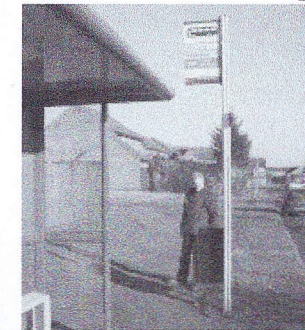
Residents want a second zebra crossing on Mobbsbury Way. There have been too many accidents involving school children. Robin has fought for this and it has now been agreed, probably soon after the completion of the redevelopment of Nobel School in 2012. Another £15,000 is still needed - but Robin has pledged that the zebra crossing will be a priority for the local budget he controls as the local county councillor.

Above: Robin (Manor ward, right) often checks street lights, bollards and signs are lit properly and reports those that are out or damaged. "Being a bit of a nightowl helps this task!" he says. He has also had dozens of potholes repaired. On the left is neighbouring Chells Liberal Democrat candidate Tim Neale.

Right: Robin checks the new bus shelter on The White Way near Sweyns Mead. Local residents told him they wanted it. Robin made sure the Chells and Manor Action Team found the money for it.



Below: New litter/dog mess bin on The White Way. Robin got it put there, following local residents' suggestion for it. And when Stevenage Council forgot to empty it, Robin got it sorted out.



Above: Robin noticed this broken and dangerous path edge at Emperor's Gate and has arranged for it to be repaired

Left: Robin regularly checks your salt bins are filled up in winter weather - he got this one refilled at The Glebe. It is difficult to get the county council to agree to place new bins - but Robin Parker got them to place 4 new salt bins in Chells recently (these were the only new bins the county council allowed in Stevenage this year). As well as that, he has organized a bin for Ross Court residents using his Locality Budget - to be fitted before next winter!



Left: In 2010, Robin got the dangerous, uneven paving here at Mobbsbury shops put right. But what a mess was left by the council contractors doing the job, when they damaged roots of 2 of the 3 trees in this grassed area. Robin made sure they tidied up the area and cycle racks and here he inspects the work. Robin has told the county council that the two trees should be replaced and he is pursuing this.
